RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING BUFFALO CHIP FLIPS UNDER NBA SANCTION

1. Only pure unadulterated 100% organic buffalo chips will be used. Domestic cattle chips, beefalo chips, and hybrid chips are unacceptable. No distinction will be made between bull chips and cow chips.
2. The buffalo producing the chips will not be fed cement kiln dust, heavy grains, buck shot, or any other product that could alter the weight of the projectile.
3. No adding or including heavy objects, such as rocks, will be allowed.
4. No chip under three (3) inches in diameter will be used in competition.
5. Each contestant is allowed to choose his own chip from a common stockpile, first

come, first served. In the event of a crowd, chips in a good condition may be used.

6. Chips will not be eaten.
7. Distance flipping: The object of distance flipping is to hurl, throw or otherwise propel a buffalo chip, without the use of artificial devices, as far down the prairie as is humanly possible without injuring any one...including one's self.
8. There is no rule 8.
9. Number of flips allowed each contestant is up to the discretion of the judges.
10. Flipping out of bounds, i.e. into the crowd, at judges, at TV cameras, or at other contestants will be severely penalized.
11. Flipping out of bounds because of ineptitude will not be penalized. Determination of intent will be at the discretion of the judges.
12. In the event the chip deteriorates in midair or on contact with the ground, the largest remaining piece that lands will be judged.
13. Chips that roll upon contact with the ground will be judged from the point of first contact with the ground (or whatever).
14. Contestants will be allowed to flip in any manner that is comfortable to them. Manner or style of flipping will in no way prejudice the judges.
15. All decisions by the judges are final. Disagreements may be met with a chip to the face. Rules may be made up or altered by the judges at any time, even in the middle of a flip.
16. No one will be allowed to parade around with a "chip" on his/her shoulder.
17. Wadding or in any way altering the natural form of the chip is strictly forbidden and all throws of this manner will be disqualified.
18. Licking fingers immediately following the handling of the chip is not forbidden; however, the practice is discouraged.
19. Chip flips are recommended to occur following, rather than prior to, a meal

11. The decisions of the judges are final.
12. One (1) gallon of compost is required for each exhibit. Compost entries must be submitted in sealed (Ziplock® type) plastic bag and can be measured using a gallon milk container with the top cut off.
13. Winners are required to pick up ribbons and premiums on Sunday, the last day of the Farm Fair between 5:00 - 6:00 p.m. Ribbons and premiums not picked up may be forfeited. No ribbons or premiums will be mailed.
14. Entries will be divided into a group for individuals and a group for professionals/master gardeners/organizations.
15. The first and second place winners from each category will compete for champion and reserve champion.

2. Products should be free from defects or blemishes, strings, stems, seeds, pits and peels. Some recipes may require stems, pits and/or peels to remain; this is acceptable if the recipe is in keeping with approved guidelines.
3. Liquids should cover the product, keeping within the head-space guidelines.
4. Liquids should be clear and free from cloudiness and small particles.
5. Product should retain its natural characteristic color or as nearly that of standard cooking product. It should be free from undue color loss.
6. Texture should be tender but not overcooked.
7. Product should maintain its shape and size appropriate for recipe and preparation method.

4. Judges may disqualify any exhibit not meeting the rules and regulations as stated.
5. All exhibits must be newly completed within the past year.

7. Mixed Technique refers to a use of both machine and hand quilting and piecing.
8. Crazy Quilts may be judged in Class 31 in Embroidery Department.
9. Quilts entered in classes 1-12 and 16-18 should be bed-sized quilts, at least twin size.
10. Home accessories include lap quilts, tablecloths, hoops, purses, tote bags, etc.

11. Classes 10 and 11 and classes 30 and 31 are classes intended to giving the beginning quilter an opportunity to enter their first project attempted of significant size.
12. Entries from exhibitors living outside of the Farm Fair limits will be accepted.
