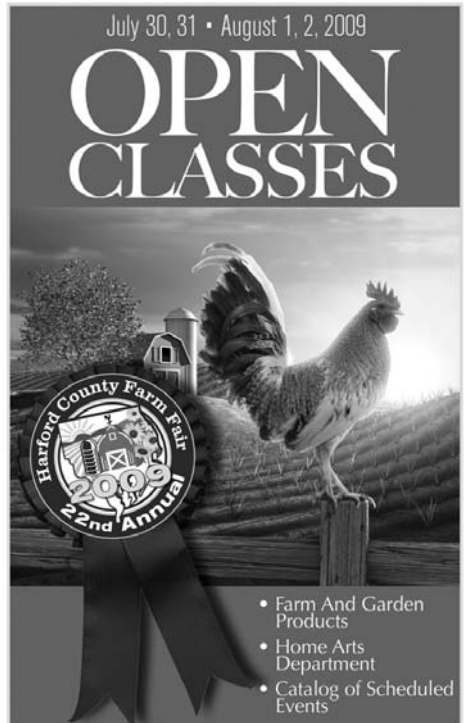

1. The contest is open to residents of Harford County and within a 20 mile radius surrounding the fair grounds, 8 years old and older.
2. Only one exhibit per entrant.
3. Entry forms are available at the compost educational exhibit during the Farm Fair or at the Maryland Cooperative Extension Office Trailer.
4. Compost entries must be received at the office of the Harford County Extension Service by the close of business (4:00 p.m.), the 15th of May 2009.
5. Compost entries must be submitted on or before the due date to allow adequate time for judging.
6. Compost entry must have been made by entrant from farm animal manures, yard materials, and/or garden materials. Compost made from human or pet wastes will not be allowed.
7. Compost entries will become the property of the Harford County Farm Fair following judging.
8. Winners will be posted during the Farm Fair.
9. Compost entries may be on display during the Farm Fair.
10. Compost entries will be judged for completeness of composting, organic content, and suitability for growing plants.
11. The decisions of the judges are final.
12. One (1) gallon of compost is required for each exhibit. Compost entries must be submitted in sealed (Ziplock® type) plastic bag and can be measured using a gallon milk container with the top cut off.
13. Winners are required to pick up ribbons and premiums on Sunday, the last day of the Farm Fair between **6:30 – 7:30 P.M.** Ribbons and premiums not picked up may be forfeited. No ribbons or premiums will be mailed.

14. Entries will be divided into two groups

1. Adults 2. Youth

15. The first and second place winners from each category will compete for champion and reserve champion.

Eligibility

1. All eligible entries must be canned using the same brand of jar and lid: Ball® Jar sealed with a Ball® Band with Dome® Lid, or Ball® Collection Elite™ Decorative Band with Dome® Lid, or canned in a Kerr® Jar sealed with a Kerr® Band with a Self-Sealing® Lid, or a Ball® Collection Elite® Decorative Band with Dome® Lid.
2. Entries in the general Soft Spreads categories must be prepared using one of the Ball® Fruit Jell® Pectins: Regular, No Sugar needed, or Liquid. The UPC from the Ball® Fruit Jell® package must accompany the entry as proof of purchase.

2. If product was not processed according to approved recommendations, it must be disqualified.

Product Appearance:

1. Pieces should be uniform in size and packing snugly but allow for circulation of liquids.
2. Products should be free from defects or blemishes, strings, stems, seeds, pits and peels. Some recipes may require stems, pits and/or peels to remain; this is acceptable if the recipe is in keeping with approved guidelines.
3. Liquids should cover the product, keeping within the head-space guidelines.
4. Liquids should be clear and free from cloudiness and small particles.
5. Product should retain its natural characteristic color or as nearly that of standard cooked product. It should be free from undue color loss.
6. Texture should be tender but not overcooked.
7. Product should maintain its shape and size appropriate for recipe and preparation method.

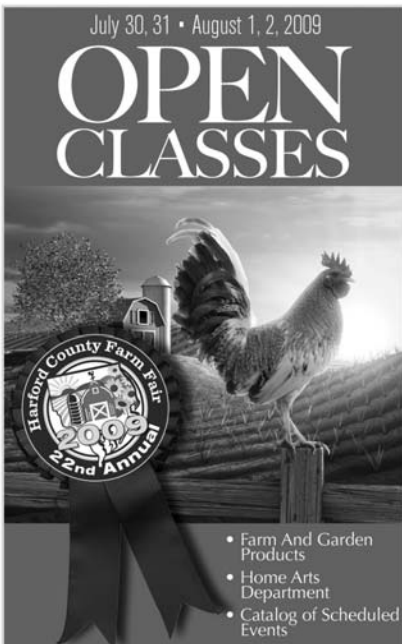
